1. Nari Sashaktikaran MAD Project run by NSS UNIT

The simple and highly fruitful concept MAKE A DIFFERENCE through MUTTHI ANAAJ DAAN (M.A.D) is a thought first came to a group of enthusiastic young group who belonged to the Lions Club of Sion and Lions Club International, who wanted to Make A Difference for the underprivileged. For this project all one must do is put a fistful of grain in aplastic jar over the course of a month at home while cooking and hand over to team. That respective contribution is checked, packed, and distributed to the needy students.

Objective:

- To connect with economically and socially weak students and their parents through the Mutthi Anaj Daan Project.
- Help them in continuation of their higher study as most of them are 1stgeneration learners.

Process:

Students from the college are shortlisted through a rigorous screening and a final list is prepared for the grain's distribution. M.A.D. being tied in with education, only those continuing with their education are eligible to benefit with 5 kg riceand 2 kg tur daal every month. To continue the services during vacation the N.S.S unit plans to give them grains before Diwali and summer vacation in advance. So that there is no discontinuation of services. Not only foodgrains but umbrella and notebooks are also distributed to these needy students under this project.

Outcome:

Number of beneficiaries increased since June 2016 from 125 to 250 in 2020-21. This year 300 needy students were benefited from this noble project. More donors too have joined the initiative and as a result in the year 2022-2023 on an average 300 needy students (were provided grains every month) benefited in this project.

2. Green Club run by Sociology Department

Objective:

The Green Club of the college was set up with the purpose to engage students in activities that would enhance their environmental awareness; to design these activities as part of the courses that earn them credits, too.

Context:

The implementation of NEP 2020 gave us freedom to initiate co-curricular activities that would earn credits for students. Besides, college administration has been sensitive to environmental issues that plague our country and planet at large. This was the right opportunity to initiate a Green Club that would educate students about environmental issues, and they would also study these as a part of their college course.

Practice:

The Green Club was offered under the vertical of co-curricular activities, which earn students two credits. This choice was offered along with NSS, NCC and Yoga and Health. One hundred and sixty-eight (168) students made a choice of joining the Green Club.

Over the year, Green Club organised Natural Colour Making Workshop to skill students in preparing and selling non-chemical colours. Students participated in Y-Waste, a government programme of taking up seven activities in which they would actively save water, electricity, daily use materials. They donated clothes, avoided single use of plastic and used cloth bags. Fifteen trees were planted by thirty-three students under Tree Plantation Drive. A Disaster Management course was conducted to train students. At the end of it, students prepared emergency kits for themselves and also helped their neighbours do it.

Over and above activities, students also learnt theory behind greed house effect, wet waste, dry waste, global warming and issues of increasing waste. They watched films about these issues.

Evidence of Success:

The number of students opted for Green Club is a sign of success; moreover, they persisted with it and participated in all activities enthusiastically. They themselves became aware of environmental problems and also engaged their neighbours in it. Thus, the purpose of holding these activities was served.

Challenges:

The next task would be to enrol more students in the Green Club. It is always possible to increase the strength of the members. Another challenge is to transport students to distant places to hold activities, for in Mumbai our college doesn't have a large campus to conduct environment related activities.
