2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

The significant activities undertaken by the IQAC this year are:-

- The IQAC along with the Placement Cell organised the Employability Skills Training Programme using the Smart Classrooms set up with sponsorship of SAS.
- Another proposal for additional 3 smart classrooms was prepared, submitted and accepted by SAS. Work will begin soon on setting up these classrooms.
- The format for the Annual Self- Appraisal was modified and an orientation workshop was arranged for all teachers. Principal Dr. Leena Raje conducted this workshop.
- An addition of Hindi translation of the TAQs was completed to facilitate the feedback received from students studying in the regional languages.

Implementation of SMES- SAS CSR program for improving employability skills of students with the help of placement cell.	6 Smart Classrooms were set up in College with funding by SAS India Pvt. Ltd with the aim of providing training to our students in order to enhance their employability skills. The smart classrooms also proved to be an effective teaching aid for regular classes. Along with Placement Cell, 3 Employability skills Training programmes were initiated. For the MCom, BCom, BCom-AFI and BMS students, in collaboration with Technoserve; for BA(English medium) and BAMM in collaboration with Antarang Foundation and for MA and BA (Marathi Medium) 36 sessions were arranged with experts in soft skills training. 38 students were placed in different companies at the end of the training.
Workshops on quality enhancement in academics and administration for teaching and nonteaching staff.	Workshops on Academic and Administrative Audit were conducted for teaching and non-teaching staff, on New API format for teachers and on Paperless Office for non-teaching staff. Two training sessions in Using Smart Classrooms were arranged for teachers. A 2 day workshop on ICT Tools was organised for Junior College teachers.
Modifying the process of conducting Academic Audit and initiating the process of administrative audit.	The current proforma for Academic Audit was made more comprehensive. A Score Card was designed for the Audit. Departments were asked to submit a soft copy of the Departmental Audit. An Internal Audit Team will be trained to conduct the Academic Audit of the departments which will then be presented before an external audit team. The protocol for Administrative Audit will be formalised.



2.8 Examination/ Evaluation Reforms initiated by the Institution (for example: Open Book Examination, Bar Coding, Double Valuation, Photocopy, Online Multiple Choice Questions)

- Semester III and IV examinations are included as University examinations.
- The Semester I and II examinations are conducted at the College level.
- For all the semesters, internal assessment of 25 marks is conducted by the college.
- Internal assessment for 25 marks is conducted using innovative evaluation methods: skits, power point presentations, online submission of assignments, exhibitions, and field visit reports. An average of the marks obtained in the internal assessment is calculated.
- At the college level, 3 sets of Question papers are sent via mail to the examination committee. At the time of examination, a set is randomly selected by the committee for printing.
- Provision of verification of marks, revaluation and photocopy of answer sheets both at the university and college levels.

2.12 How does IQAC Contribute/Monitor/Evaluate the Teaching & Learning processes:

- The IQAC has been preparing of the Academic Calendar (Annexure No. 10) for every semester. The Annual Academic Plan Book designed by the IQAC is used every year by every teacher to plan lessons, to record lectures conducted, the teaching method used and activities conducted in the department. The Academic Plan Book is submitted to the Faculty In-charge at the end of every month for reviewing purpose. Schedules for Internal Assessment are prepared at the beginning of each semester and every student receives a copy of the schedule. Thus a student is made aware of when and how internal assessment will be conducted at the beginning of the semester itself. In order to acquire feedback for teachers from students a Teacher Assessment Questionnaire (TAQ) has been designed and used. The TAQ designed as a google form is filled on-line by students as per a schedule prepared. The TAQ has been translated into Hindi for students learning in regional languages.
- The Key Result Area (KRA) Team for Criterion II, Teaching- Learning and Evaluation has been monitoring each department each semester to monitor the various

teaching and evaluation methods used including innovative methods such as ICT techniques for teaching, learning and evaluation. Under the SMES- SAS CSR project the college has developed 3 basic and 3 advanced smart classrooms. 2 training sessions were arranged for all teachers in using the smart classrooms for effective teaching learning. Teachers are using the smart classrooms.





• Mutthi Anaaj Daan





- Psychology Department prepared a list of words commonly used academic writing of the subject. This vocabulary list is gradually introduced to students to familiarise them with the words.



Best Practice I

Increasing Students' Employability

Goal:

To teach such skills to students that would make them competent enough to fetch a job after graduation **Context:**

We observed that some of our students, despite being academically good, lacked certain skills that employers value in fresh candidates. This included soft skills like speaking with finesse, writing effectively, facing a job-interview and conducting themselves at workplace.

Practice:

College collaborated with Antarang Foundation and started 'Career Ready' programme for TYBA students. Two batches of 35 students each underwent the intensive training course for one semester. Similarly, Technoserve, too, started 'Job Skill Development Programme', training two batches of 40 students each for one semester. SAS CSR trained one batch of students under SNEH (Sanitation, Nutrition, Empowerment and Health/Hygiene), a wholesome education programme, which included modules that made students 'placement ready.'

Evidence of Success:

At the end of academic semesters of 2016-17, as many as fifty students found placements in companies like ICICI Prudential, Prodata, HDFC Securities, ICICI Bank, HERE Solutions, ICICI Lombard and so on. Fifteen reputed companies came over for placements through Technoserve, Antarang and SAS.

Challenges:

Arranging rooms for these courses was an initial difficulty, but we could overcome it by re-arranging the time-table.

Best Practice II Smart Class Rooms in College

Goal:

To increase the use of technology and web-based resources in teaching.

Context:

Many valuable resources are available on the world wide web for all the areas. Although most faculty members now carry a laptop to classes, they could not use the web-based resources for education as the laptop screens are too small to be used in class. Besides, some faculty members also had notes on the laptop, and they also wanted to save their black-board notes for future use. Challenges:

Considering the number of students in college, we require more smart classrooms. Setting up more such smart class rooms will take time and resources.
