#### (ii) Themes:

Workshops were organised by the IQAC for different stakeholders at the college level:

- For the teaching faculty: The IQAC, 'Utthaan' along with the BCA Department of Dr. BMN College and the Computer Training Center of our college arranged a 6 days ICT Training Programme for all Faculty members from 8 January to 13 January 2018. Additional sessions for Excel and Animoto were held on 18 January and 22 January 2018 respectively.
- The IQAC in association with the Psychology department organised a workshop on Teaching, Learning and Contemporary Evaluation Methods by Dr. Geeta Shetty, Associate Professor, St. Xavier's Institute of Education on 20 -3-2018. This program was organised for the teaching faculty from our college, faculty members from BMN College of Home Science, Ruparel and SIWS College also attended the workshop
- The IQAC in association with the Library organised a lecture on IPR by Dr. Sameena Hasan for all faculty members on 5-3-2018. Students of the BCA, Dr. BMN College of Home Science and Principal of SMES Nursing College, Mrs. Anjali Katdare also attended the lecture.
- Along with the Department of Management Studies the IQAC organised a lecture on "Teachers by Design or by Default" by Mr. Gerald D'cunha, Lifecoach for Degree and Junior College teachers on 14 Oct. 2017.

#### For IQAC members:-

• Dr. Mangaonkar, Principal of Khalsa College was invited to give his guidance on CPE Grant Utilisation on 14 December 2017. Dr. Ashok Salve was also invited to interact with IQAC members and give his inputs for utilisation of CPE Grant on 11 December 2017.

#### 2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

The significant activities undertaken by the IQAC this year are: -

- The IQAC newsletter Utthaan was released on the College Website on 5 September 2017. The theme for the newsletter was the UGC CPE status awarded to the college and utilisation of the grant.

- The IQAC prepared the second proposal for CSR grants from SAS India Ltd. The college could develop 3 more Advanced Smart Classrooms and the Basic Smart Classrooms developed from the earlier grant were upgraded to Advanced Smart Classrooms with the CSR Grant.

# 2.8 Examination/ Evaluation Reforms initiated by the Institution (for example: Open Book Examination, Bar Coding, Double Valuation, Photocopy, Online Multiple-Choice Questions)

- For UG programs, Semester III IV, V and VI and for PG programs, all Semester examinations are conducted by SNDT Women's University.
- For UG programs, the Semester I and II examinations are conducted at the College level.
- For UG programs for all the semesters, internal assessment of 25 marks is conducted by the college. An average of the marks obtained in at least 3 internal assessments is calculated that includes one written test and 2 innovative evaluation methods such as skits, power point presentations, online submission of assignments, practical, field visit reports.
- At the college level, for conducting the end of semester examination (I and II), 2 sets of subject-wise question papers are set by faculty teaching those papers. The sets are approved by the head of the department and then submitted as a soft copy to the Examination Committee on a pre-decided date of submission. At the time of examination, one set is randomly selected by the committee for printing.
- The student is provided with facilities of verification of marks, revaluation and photocopy of answer sheets both at the college and university levels.
- A Grievance Committee for Examinations looks into all matters related to malpractices during examinations and their redressal as per guidelines of the University

#### 2.12 How does IQAC Contribute/Monitor/Evaluate the Teaching & Learning processes:

- The IQAC has been preparing of the **Academic Calendar** for every semester. The **Annual Academic Plan Book** designed by the IQAC is maintained by every teaching faculty to plan lessons, to record lectures conducted, the teaching method used and activities conducted in the department. The Academic Plan Book is submitted to the departmental head, Faculty In-charge/ Vice Principal at the end of every month for reviewing purpose. In order to acquire feedback for teachers from students a **Teacher Assessment Questionnaire** (TAQ) has been designed and used. The TAQ designed as a Google form is filled on-line by students as per a schedule prepared. The TAQ has been translated into Hindi for students learning in regional languages. In the academic year 2017-18, along with the TAQ, feedback was sought from students related to the curriculum, infrastructural facilities and support services available in the college. This feedback was also analysed and action was initiated accordingly.
- The Key Result Area (KRA) Team for Criterion II, Teaching- Learning and Evaluation has been encouraging departments to use innovative and a variety of

- teaching and evaluation methods such as ICT techniques, group discussions and debates, film screenings and discussions for teaching, learning and evaluation.
- The IQAC organised a week-long ICT Training Program for all faculty in collaboration with the College Computer Training Centre and the BCA Department of Dr. BMN College of Home Science. The details of the program are given in Annexure No. 11
- The IQAC also organised a workshop conducted by Dr. Geeta Shetty, Associate Professor, St. Xavier's College of Education on "Teaching, Learning and Contemporary Evaluation Methods". This workshop was organised along with the Department of Psychology. Besides the college faculty, teachers from neighbouring colleges- Dr. BMN College of Home Science, Ruparel College and SIWS College also participated in this workshop.

    - -First session of the series titled 'Importance of Title, Objectives and Hypothesis in Research' was held on 5<sup>th</sup> February 2018 by Dr. Arvind Dhond, St. Xavier's College for M. Com., MA (Psychology & Hindi) students as well as interested staff members.
    - -Second session of the series titled 'How to write good research paper' was held on 27<sup>th</sup> February 2018 by Dr. Savitri Kulkarni, Welingkar Institute of Management & Research for MA (Psychology) and M. Com. students. On the same day, Dr. Satish Pandey, HOD, K G Somaiya college, conducted lecture titled 'How to write good research paper' for MA (Hindi) students.
    - -Third session of the series was a workshop on 'Using SPSS package for statistical analyses' by Ms Manisha Pandey, Lecturer, Joshi Bedekar College of Arts, was conducted for MA (Psychology) students on 9<sup>th</sup> March 2018.
  - A document titled 'Code of Ethics in Research' was prepared by the subcommittee of Research Cell. This was approved by Research Cell and subsequently by Management.
  - Minor research proposals of six faculty members were received for funding by management. Internal expert committee evaluated the same and four proposals were approved for further process. The projects were further scrutinised by Ethics Committee of Seva Mandal Education Society on 7<sup>th</sup> March 2018. After incorporating suggestions given by Ethics Committee, the four proposals were sent to experts in the field for final approval on 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2018. (Annexure No 12)

  - **BMS Dept.:** organized 15 days" Basic Computer Course training in collaboration with St. Catherine's Home, Versova. Nearly 25 students from BMS dept. imparted training to 100 children.
  - **Department of Home Economics** observed World Breast-Feeding Week with L&T Medical Centre. Various programme such as poster and chart display, lecture-demonstration on Importance of Complementary Feeding for infants, skit on Importance of Breast feeding were organised for the residents of Milind Nagar slums, Powai.
  - **Department of Foundation Courses** organized Internship Program for B.A II English Medium students. As a part of the social work component, this activity was planned so as to sensitize the students to various contemporary issues and problems prevailing in the society. The students conducted activities in various NGOs such as Salaam Bombay Foundation, Byramjee Jeejeebhoy Home for Children, Don Bosco

Shelter for Women, Society for Human and Environment Development, Gulshan-A-Toiba Foundation as per their requirements. Dept. has also collaborated with Manav Seva Sangh for extension work.

- **Department of Psychology**: A workshop on "Career Guidance" was conducted for students of 10<sup>th</sup> standard of K.G. Patil Vidyalaya, Deoghar, Wada. A similar workshop was conducted for tribal students of Shaas Maadhya Ashramshala under the Adivasi Vikas Vibhag, Budhaavali and Wada.
- Samvedana Counseling Cell: College Counsellor along with the MA interns conducted workshops at Andhra School under the Urban Outreach Programme of the Department of Psychology. On 'Importance of education and study skills' for six divisions for 9<sup>th</sup> standard students of Andhra School, Wadala, on 1<sup>st</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> February 2018. The students were explained the importance of regular studying, and of the use of strategies that help in effective learning and building of transferable skills.

A workshop on 'Effective study skills' for selected weak SSC students of on 2<sup>nd</sup> February 2018 and conducted an interactive session with students of VIII standard on 12<sup>th</sup> April 2018.

#### **Consultation Services for Amulakh School**

The counselling centre of the school was visited regularly by college counsellor. Guidance regarding documentation, assessments and individual cases was provided to promote and ensure effective functioning of the counselling centre.

- NSS Unit organized Blood Donation, tree plantation, swachta abhiyaan in collaboration with Lions' Club of Sion and LTMG Hospital, Sion. - Cleanliness Drive: On 11<sup>th</sup> August 2017, NSS Unit participated in Cleanliness Drive Awareness programme at King Circle Railway station, collaboration with Central Railway Station Mumbai Division. Volunteers prepared slogans and posters related to the Cleanliness at Railway stations and displayed them on the platform to create awareness amongst the passengers. Besides arranging for cleanliness activity, the volunteers were also on a drive to educate passengers on keeping the platform clean through an oath and sign campaign. Media coverage has been done of this event. The King's Circle station received an award from.... The NSS Unit of the college was felicitated by the Station Master for their contribution to the cleanliness of the station.

#### **6.3.2** Teaching and Learning

- The Academic Calendar is prepared by the IQAC for every semester
- The Academic Plan Book designed by the IQAC is filled as a log by every teacher which helps to maintain a record of academic activities
- Departments have made extensive use of the smart classrooms for enhancing the teaching-learning process.

#### **Academic Advancement Centre:**

• A centre for conducting various value addition courses, targeting various sections of students became functional. The centre in association with the Psychology Department conducted a learning level test for all students. This helped in identifying academically weak and advanced learners. A number of programmes were then conducted for these students which helped students to learn according to their learning levels

#### **6.3.3** Examination and Evaluation

- The College has a semester system where 75% marks are allocated for the end of semester examination and 25% are for continuous internal assessment.
- The College follows university rules and procedures for conducting the firstyear exams.
- The students have the provision for re-verification and revaluation of their papers as well as getting a photocopy of their answer sheets. This is followed at the college level as well.
- Departments are encouraged to include atleast 2 innovative evaluation methods as internal assessment such as- PowerPoint presentations, student's seminars, reports of field visits, discussions following film screenings, on-line submission of assignments, role-play and skits. This is done so that students develop skills such as self-study, experiential learning, creativity and analytical abilities.
- For the first-year semester examinations, the departments submit 2 copies of papers online to the Examination Committee. The committee selects any one set for printing for the current semester. A Duplo machine is available near the Principal's cabin for printing the questions papers.

#### **6.3.4** Research and Development

- The Research Cell presented a budget for research activities which was sanctioned by the management.
- Lecture series entitled: "Inspiring Research" was initiated. The sessions were held in the months of February and March.
- Faculty Minor Researches, funded through the management were facilitated in order to encourage faculty members to undertake research projects. The projects were approved for funding by the management only after Ethics Committee scrutiny.

#### **Innovations and Best Practices**

# 7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

A few instances of the innovations which have had a positive impact during 2017-18 are listed below:

- With the CPE Grant, a number of new activities could be planned. Infrastructure augmentation linked to innovations in teaching, learning and skill development for students was one of the key areas identified. This included setting up of the Language Lab to improve English reading and writing skills of students. The Food Science laboratory is under renovation which will make it possible to accommodate more students and start innovative courses in cookery and food processing besides conduction of regular practical. More classrooms are to be converted into smart classrooms to make teaching learning more effective. A multi-purpose laboratory will be set up to accommodate 15 desktops for extending value added courses such as Advanced Tally, GST training and Digital Marketing to all students. Provisions will be made for Lecture capturing Systems. With ICT tools being installed, training of teachers in use of the ICT tools was also facilitated. As a result, the Department of Accountancy began using smart classes extensively. Economics Department started the practice of telecasting the budget session live for students. This followed by a discussion of government's fiscal and financial status.
- A number of Value-added courses were initiated this year along with the existing courses which are running successfully- such as training students in Modi Script. Many of the historical documents are available in the ancient language of Modi and there is need for interpreters who can understand the language and help understand these documents. 4 students obtained placements after this training. Hindi translation was another value-added course. College library celebrated Vaachan Prerana Diwas to inspire students to read more and also Marathi Bhasha Diwas to promote the use of local, regional language.
- To enhance the performance of our sports students, the Psychology Department started a course in Athlete management for the sports students. Supplementary Nutrition programme was initiated for sports students to further boost their performance. Students are provided nutritious khichadi, Milk and Banana with help from the College management and donations received.
- The NSS unit celebrated *makarsankranti* in Manmoli, a village adopted by them in collaboration with the Lions Club. NSS unit distributed books, dustbins and toys to village residents on the day. The College has also adopted the King's Circle Local Railway station which is the nearest station to the college used by staff as well as students. As a goodwill gesture, cleaning and beautification of the station has been taken up by the NSS Unit.

3.	Implementation of revised process of conducting Academic Audits	The process was made more rigorous. Departments were scored with the help of a score sheet designed on the basis of the NAAC criteria by 2 teams comprising of IQAC and non-IQAC faculty members. All documentation was checked. A feedback was given to departments during the audit. A meeting was convened to discuss the scores and a copy of the score sheet was given to all departments.



#### **Best Practice I**

#### **Annual Academic Audit**

#### Goal:

To audit each department's academic work, carried out throughout the year.

#### **Context:**

We felt that although every department regularly carried out academic programmes over the year, a standard format should be devised to evaluate departments' achievements. To serve this purpose, we began conducting an internal audit of every department. The departments will be evaluated by external auditors later.

#### **Practice:**

Considering the basic requirements of every department's activities, and also aiming for the overall improvement of each department, college prepared an evaluation scheme for departments. Two teams of four members each, consisting of three IQAC members and one senior faculty member, evaluated all the departments over three days. The departments were asked to produce routine things like attendance books and teaching-plan books, over and above documentary evidence for every claim they made for activities the conducted.

#### **Evidence of Success:**

By this evaluation process, all departments properly organised various documents related to their activities. By the thought process involved in preparing the file to face the academic audit, the faculty members themselves learnt where they were lacking and how some departments focused on only specific activities. Eventually, the exercise helped all departments to diversify the academic work they had been engaged in. As an offshoot of annual academic audit, now every department prepares a budget for the proposed activities and its approximate expenditure at the beginning of the year. This has immensely helped the management to prepare for the expenses and the IQAC to prepare the academic calendar.

#### **Challenges:**

Since we had formed two teams of four members each to conduct the audit, we sensed that each team had a different way to approach the audit questions and evaluation. We decided that a single team of five members would do a better job.

#### **Best Practice II**

#### **Academic Advancement Centre**

#### Goal:

To improve overall academic performance of students

#### **Context:**

We realised that our students, since most belonged to families that do not spend money on value addition activities for a girl child. Hence, when girls reach college, they are found to be weak in oral communication, writing skills, computer skills, handwriting quality, vocabulary and so on.

#### **Practice:**

Academic Advancement Centre began conducting various value addition courses, targeting various sections of students. This filled the gap in students' abilities as they learnt many things that they should have ideally learnt at secondary school level. The centre also focuses on making students aware of various career avenues in their respective fields.

With this in mind, the centre conducted Learning Level Tests for all the UG and PG students to categorise them and then over the year conducted workshops on self-motivation, effective communication, online trading and presentation skill.

#### **Evidence of Success:**

Students' enthusiastic response is the most significant evidence of success for these small courses. Students stay back for courses even after the regular classes get over and attend the courses with interest.

#### **Challenges:**

Since our college is in Mumbai city, known for space crunch, we often find it difficult to provide rooms for classes to be conducted for the Academic Advancement Centre. We can, however, overcome this challenge by making extensive adjustments to the time-table.

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
